As when we trained service monkeys from the 1980s through 2020, our goal today is to provide tools that allow individuals to have opportunities to pursue meaningful careers, advanced educational degrees, and fulfilling personal lives.

Currently, we are looking at three areas including:

- Assistive and adaptive devices
- Robotics
- Virtual reality (VR)

How Does It All Work?

Technology and how individuals use it or what technology they need may vary. Many adults need assistive or adaptive devices to help them daily, and provide the independence necessary for work or school.

Assistive Technology Program

Our initial gateway offering will be the Assistive Technology Program. Assistive devices could be technology that can be easily purchased, easy to use, and make an individual's day-to-day life easier. They are devices that are not covered by insurance and an individual or family cannot afford on their own. (i.e., Amazon's Fire TV Cube or Echo). The device will not only provide independence for the individual, but may also provide the caregiver with some free time.

We will provide up to \$2,000 in financial support for needed devices. These can be anything that makes one's home safer, helps with socialization, or assists with school or work technology. This is a financial-needs based program, and the seed money was provided by a grant from Liberty Mutual Foundation.

Robotics and Virtual Reality (VR) Programs

We are beginning our Robotics and VR Programs with pilot projects that will ascertain how advanced technologies provide independence to someone with limited mobility.

Pilot Projects

We are currently engaging in pilot projects to determine how the innovative technology in development will:

- Improve quality of life and assist in daily needs for those living with disabilities.
- Provide peace of mind for the primary caregiver.







Transition in Process

If you are a regular reader of *Monkey Business*, our eNewsletter, you know we are transitioning from offering service animals to exploring various options to providing innovative technologies for those living with mobility impairments.

Transition is messy. There is no magic solution to transforming the way an organization does business. However, the steps the board and staff have taken to date are ensuring that the transition will continue to provide enhanced quality of life and opportunities for people with physical challenges. The transition is looking at both the present and the future—developing programs and collaborations that will be important for Helping Hands for the next five, ten, twenty, even fifty years.

Where We Are Going

As we go through our transition, we are guided by two key principles.

- Providing innovative technologies and quality-of-life opportunities to those living with physical disabilities.
- Taking care of our post-service monkeys until the end of their natural lives.

Our Future

As an organization dedicated to working with those living with disabilities, we look at our history with great pride. Our new initiatives allow us to continue to serve the disability community by providing resources through the utilization of robotics, assistive devices, Augmented Reality (AR), Virtual Reality (VR), and Artificial

Intelligence (AI).

We are looking to take the 40+ years of experience, intellectual property, and insights Helping Hands has gained in service to the disability community and offer it in collaboration with robotic, AR, VR, and AI research organizations, universities, firms, service providers, and those living with physical impairments.

The goal of our Innovative Technology Initiative is to offer new and existing technologies, now coming on the market at a rapid pace, to help empower individuals with physical disabilities to live more independent and engaged lives.

Pilot Projects cont.

We are delighted to be collaborating with:


 Northeastern University's Institute of Experiential Robotics to ascertain if a robotic arm will assist a person with multiple sclerosis with his daily needs as well as give his caregiver peace of mind.

We are in process of brainstorming two VR projects including:

- The Billy Project looking at how to make VR gaming more accessible for those living with physical mobility impairments. This is a collaboration with a special effects company, a person living with a spinal cord injury, and a gaming company.
- Examining practical solutions to pain management, depression and other health issues due to spinal cord injuries through the use of VR. This collaboration involves two individuals living with spinal cord injuries (one of whom is also a mental health counselor working in the health care field in Boston, the other an individual in the financial arena) as well as a company in Toronto, Canada, and Helping Hands.
